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Capital Projects Update

Over recent months, we have seen continued activity on the College's two most recent capital projects under the Master Plan.

Science Facilities

The extension and refurbishment of the second stage of the Senior Science facilities was completed mid-year. The only outstanding component to this project is the construction of an external pedestrian link ramp between the two buildings. This should be completed over the next three months, at which time landscaping on the western side of the buildings will be finalised. The newly-completed laboratories provide students and staff with modern, flexible learning spaces that are suited to the nature of current Science curriculum and assessment. The feedback from staff and students to date has been very positive.

Food Technology (Home Economics) Spaces

The two Food Technology spaces on the upper level of SE block were also extended and refurbished (floor coverings, surface painting, installation of new benches and some cabinets) as part of the most recent project. Into the future, these learning spaces will be relocated to a more central area of the campus as part of a project in a later phase of the College's Master Plan. As such, the extent of this current work was primarily cosmetic as opposed to a significant, functional upgrade.

Junior School Reception, Classrooms and Car Park

This multi-faceted project is progressing very well. We anticipate the new Junior School reception facility (which contains two additional classrooms) to be operational from the commencement of Term 4, allowing the transformation of the existing reception area into two more Junior School classrooms – a total of four additional classroom spaces as part of the entire project.

This project also includes enhancements to the Junior School car park to improve pedestrian access and safety. Some paths, pedestrian access points, and stormwater drains are already evident. More access points, lighting and other enhancements will be included as the project nears completion in late November.

While new facilities are wonderful for both staff and students, some inconvenience during construction is unavoidable. I extend my thanks and gratitude to all members of the WestMAC community who have exercised understanding and forbearance during the disruptions to our normal routines.

In closing, the vitally important role of donations to the Voluntary Building Fund (VBF) cannot be overstated, and I extend sincere thanks to all who have contributed. These tax-deductible donations go directly towards the College's capital projects, and are vital to the ongoing development and improvement of the College's built environment. All families and community members are warmly invited to consider donating to the VBF – every donation, big or small, makes a positive difference to our learning environment.

Courage

As we continue exploring our theme of courage we have been looking at how we need courage to help us in times of change. Sometimes opportunities come our way but we feel afraid and do not have the courage to pursue them.

Although some people try to impress others by acting as though they are not scared, everyone feels nervous or afraid sometimes. You know, that funny feeling in your tummy, sweaty palms or maybe wobbly knees. It is possible to talk ourselves through fears most of the time. Usually, focussing on what we gain once we deal with the fear, helps us to overcome it.

At Assembly recently we looked at the character Merida from the movie *Brave*. In many ways Merida is exceptionally brave – she climbs cliffs and drinks from the Fire Falls, she is an accomplished archer and horse woman. As a princess she has come to the age when it is time for her to take on more responsibility. This means that more time needs to be devoted to acting like a princess and doing various duties and there is less time to do the things she loves. This change of focus is something that she is not at all happy about. I suspect she is afraid she does not have what it takes to be the kind of princess her mother would like her to become. Perhaps she is afraid that as a result of changing she will fail and it would be easier if things just stayed the same. As the movie progresses we see that Merida uses her strengths – the things she is good at – to solve problems and face her fears.

Merida is also a great example of someone who I think shows grit. When we are faced with change sometimes it seems so much easier to just give up and leave things be. Having grit means that we can focus on what it is that we want to achieve and keep on going until we achieve our goal.

Albert Einstein was a very famous scientist. He famously said that it was not so much that he was smart but that he just stuck with problems longer than others. He kept looking at things from different angles, changing the way he looked them, until he found a solution. This is a good example of having grit and the ability to persist.

Having the ability to persist and a growth mindset can help us to face our fears, realise our dreams and become the very best people that we can be.

Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) Applications for Year 12 students

QTAC applications opened on Thursday 3 August. Year 12 students will have until the end of September to apply on time (at a cost of \$43). Students are able to apply after this date but we are encouraging all students to have their applications submitted by the end of September. At this stage students need to be considering what their desired courses (courses they want to study), back-up courses (less competitive courses they want to study) and pathway courses (courses that will help them upgrade into a course they really want) are. Each student is encouraged to use all 6 preferences in their QTAC application. Mrs Hayes and Mrs Baker are able to assist students in determining these courses.

A significant change in the QTAC process is the Offer Round Dates. A small number of students are likely to get offers starting from Friday 17 November. Offers will continue through to the major offer round on 16 January, 2018. Applicants will have 4 days to respond to this offer. If they do not respond to the offer their application will cease, and they will need to log onto their application and follow the directions of QTAC to re-activate their application. Please note the offer round dates in the current QTAC booklet (page 21).

As some courses have fixed closing dates as early as Monday 14 August, Year 12 students need to check their QTAC Booklets (page 22 to 23) and search for dates related to the courses they are interested in.

On Monday 14 August from 12 to 1.10pm, a representative from QTAC will be presenting information regarding the QTAC application process in SC Block. All Year 12 students will be in attendance for this presentation and parents/guardians are welcome to attend. Parents/guardians, so that we can ensure that there is event seating, please RSVP via khayes@wmac.com.au

Additionally, on Wednesday 16 August (the Ekka Show Holiday), Mrs Kym Hayes will be available in the Claridge Centre (CC14) to assist students, parents/guardians in completing QTAC applications. This will run from 11am to 3pm. It is not necessary to make an appointment for this day. Mrs Hayes will be available in the computer room to answer questions during these times. Students will need to bring: their list of courses, their WestMAC ID card and knowledge of the payment method that will be used. Payment can be made at a later date via credit card, but it is important that student are aware of the preferred payment method when starting their application.

Key things that Year 12 students intending on going into tertiary studies next year should be doing:

2. Ensure they have a TFN (Tax File Number)
3. Create an account on the QTAC website – use a non-school email and put in your mobile number www.qtac.edu.au/home
4. Apply for scholarships
5. Check the fixed closing dates

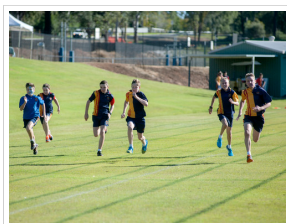

On Saturday 22nd July, three teams from the Middle School Robotics Club entered our first ever *RoboCup* competition. The competition was attended by approximately 30 schools from across the Brisbane region. Our teams competed in the Secondary Rescue category. While we didn't win or place, the teams performed admirably.

Each of our teams engineered a Lego Mindstorms robot which had to autonomously navigate a course, avoiding obstacles, and rescue a 'victim' (a coke can) in an 'oil spill'.

Our girls' team of Emma Robertson, Jessica Price and Mackenzie Talyor, achieved a perfect score in their first of three rounds. Our boys' teams; Jordan Lane and Tinashe Mapfumo, and Benjamin Hogan, Harrison Sinclair and Lachlan Ramm encountered difficulties in round one but scrambled to re-engineer their robots, and achieved excellent scores in the second round.

This was our first attempt at *RoboCup*. The nature of this competition is that knowledge and experience accumulates year-on-year, so this year's pioneering students are now well equipped to compete at a higher level, as well as advise and mentor next year's new competitors.
