Principal

This week marks the commencement of West Moreton Anglican College's Silver anniversary celebrations. On Thursday, we celebrated by thanking College founders and long-serving staff at a Founders' Day Service in the Lostroh Centre. We had the opportunity to express our gratitude for the vision and hard work of WestMAC's founders 25 years ago. In addition to our entire staff and student body from Prep to Year 12, we also welcomed Foundation Principal, Mr Paul Claridge, Foundation Chair of the College Council, Dr Hugh Bartholomeusz OAM RFD, former staff, alumni, and College Council members. Anglican Archbishop of Brisbane, The Most Reverend Dr Phillip Aspinall, officiated at the Service at which Wing Commander Brett Nansen was formally commissioned as a member of College Council. Presentations were made to long-serving staff, with a number of staff presented with ten-year service badges and twenty year service medals.

At our service, I asked those gathered to reflect on the foundations of the original vision for our College. As a context, I used an extract from Mr Paul Claridge's address at the laying of the College's Foundation stone on 18 July 1993. The focus is on the significance of our College crest and motto.

"The cross of Christ, central to our crest, shall also be central to our school, with worship and reverence a regular part of the programme. The Anglican compass rose reminds us that people of all cultures and from every point of the globe, are one in Christ and that our children must be made aware, through education, of the richness of cultural, religious and lingual diversity ...

The floral emblems express our pride and identity with Queensland and our own geographic region and remind us of our environmental responsibilities. To give succinct focus to all these features we have three simple words surmounting the crest. FAITH, KNOWLEDGE and SERVICE ...

The eagle whose protective wings arch over the crest remind us of our RAAF neighbours to the south and the biblical reference from the book of Isaiah:

... but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength; they will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. Isaiah 40:31

With these words as our lighthouse guiding our way we shall, I am quite sure, prosper and grow to God's glory."

I am struck by how relevant these words are, 25 years later. Today more than ever, we need to cultivate future leaders and citizens who can engage compassionately and productively with diversity. Today more than ever, we need our young people to care for our environment. Today more than ever, we need to raise up young people whose faith supports them push through adversity, whose knowledge equips them to grapple with and solve complex problems, and whose servant hearts motivate them to share their faith and knowledge through example and action.

Faith. Knowledge. Service. These three elements are deeply interwoven and the strength of these foundations lies in the interrelationships among all three. Take one away and the whole thing can become wobbly. But put them all together, and we have something very strong – and very special.

Founder's Day is an opportunity to express our gratitude for the vision, hard work and faith that made it possible for Foundation staff and families to keep going when things were tough so that we can enjoy the many opportunities WestMAC offers. But it is important to note that we are certainly not done yet. More is expected of us as we mature, because we have more resources available to us. But with this increased expectation, our faith increases and matures too. As we get older, we have more to look back on. This builds our faith and hope in the future. We can experience good times and not take them for granted, because we've experienced good times and bad, and we understand that neither lasts forever.

With that in mind, I'd like to acknowledge the many ways that our staff, students and families honour the Foundation vision every day. The way we treat each other, the way we apply ourselves to work, study and extra-curricular commitments, the way we listen to understand and speak to and about one another – every day, in myriad ways both small and large, we all work together to continue becoming WestMAC.

I'm very proud of our origins. I'm very proud of who we are. And I'm very proud of who we're becoming.

Student leadership in 2019

In Life Skills this year, Year 11 students have looked at some of the virtues that leaders possess, for example:integrity, courage, humility, empathy and compassion. Additionally, the students at WestMAC are instilled with the belief they can 'add value' to family, community, school and workplace, provided they believe in themselves, have the confidence and take action; along with the want to serve humanity.

Last Thursday, students participated in a Leadership Seminar entitled Leading a Legacy. During the day, students' capacity to lead was transformed by:

- identifying individual and collective personality styles and patterns (based on T.E.A.M. Dynamics)
- exploring some of the leadership strengths and challenges of each style
- discovering the value of the unique diversity within social networks
- increasing awareness of the impact that investing in relationships has on the ability to lead
- recognising the ways in which they, as leaders, place values upon the different social groups they lead
- developing practical skills to connect with those they do not know
- improving skills in deepening existing social connections
- recognising communication strategies that affect their ability to motivate and lead others

Like last year, part of the nomination process for student leadership, candidates (students in Year 11) are expected to submit a cover letter and resume, as they would if they were applying for a job. In order to prepare the students for this process during Year 11 Life Skills the students have looked at writing a cover letter and resume as key components of a job application.

This week the students were emailed information pertaining to the process involved in applying for a 2019 Student Leadership position.





2018 International Mathematical Modelling Challenge

The International Mathematical Modelling Challenge (IM²C) is a team-based mathematical competition for Australian secondary students. Operating in teams, comprising up to four students from the same school, participants must work collaboratively to solve a problem (set globally) by devising and applying an original mathematical model.

Constrained to a period of five consecutive days, teams unpack the given problem, hypothesise, test, and develop a working solution, before preparing and submitting a report on their solution to the Australian judging panel. The best two solutions then progress to compete against the other participating countries on an international level. The 2018 problem was to devise a way of deciding the best hospital in your local area. How would you measure and choose the 'best' of these local hospitals? What variables do you use and how well can you measure each? This was a particularly challenging problem given the complexity of the context, the range of different variables that might be relevant, and the difficulty of obtaining data to analyse the possibilities, devising and testing a decision-making model, and evaluating the stability and usefulness of the model developed. Perhaps the biggest challenge for teams was to complete their work in the very limited time available.

For the 2018 Challenge, a total of 163 teams across Australia registered to participate. Of those teams that entered only 75 teams actually submitted a report. The WestMAC team of Freya Domrow, Danielle Scalia, Hudson Walker and Kern Webster were recognised at Assembly last week for being one of the 75 teams to successfully submit a solution in the form of a twenty page report.

Only the top two reports from Australia were passed on to the international level of the competition. Even though the WestMAC team report was not one of the two to be sent on we are pleased to congratulate our team on, successfully completing the challenge.

Middle School

Welcome back to Term 3. I hope you had an enjoyable break and ready for another 10 week term. There is a lot of exciting things happening this term and I very much look forward to sharing these with you and the students.

One of the most important aspects of my position as Head of Middle School is to create and maintain a safe space for all Middle School students. Last term saw us embrace the value of kindness, respecting all students regardless of difference. The

students engaged in the benefits of choosing kindness above all.

This week at assembly I reaffirmed the value of kindness and that is not isolated to last term but a value that is embedded as an important part of our everyday lives here at the College. I believe that it is a reasonable expectation that all students are kind to one another.

I further explained to the students that the language we use illustrates our level of kindness. The way we use language shows people who we really are. With our value of kindness in mind, I encouraged students to continue to use positive, supportive and respectful language.

Although speaking to the small minority, I did make it very clear to those students who choose to use inappropriate language that there will be significant consequences. Examples of inappropriate language include:

- Threatening another person with physical violence making them feel unsafe in any way
- Threatening another person's safety
- Using offensive language e.g. swearing
- Using degrading statements. That is, statements that
 put down someone because of their gender, race,
 background or beliefs. It is never just a joke and
 saying it was just a joke is not a defence nor a
 justification
- Using appropriate language applies to all areas of the College. Whether it be playing sport, in the classroom or in student's free time – inappropriate language is not to be used
- This expectation also extends to student online behaviour. As like here at the College, the same expectations of respectful interactions are expected.

Most importantly students need to understand that there is never a time, nor a place, for this type of inappropriate language. It is never just a joke or something that they just do. As I stated earlier, I want all students to feel safe and respected.

The use of inappropriate language is few and far between. The Middle School at WestMAC is a vibrant and exciting place to be. Each day I see our students showing great care, respect and empathy towards one another. Inappropriate language is certainly not the norm. Although, I do feel it is important that I state that it will not be tolerated. Those few students who neglect to choose kindness and appropriate language must expect a significant consequence including suspension or review of their enrolment.

Student Collection after Saturday Sport

Please be aware of departure and collection times for the Bus to and from TAS Sport on a Saturday. The bus will not wait for late arrivals, and it is also not fair for staff to be left waiting for a significant amount of time for students to be picked up at the end of the day. Our arrivals are always approximations and we always get students to call parents letting them know if the arrival time back at the College is going to be different to the advertised time.

The Associated Schools (TAS) Code of Conduct

At the start of a new Trimester of TAS Sport, students, parents and spectators are reminded of the TAS Association's Code of Conduct. Last term, there were a number of isolated instances of indiscretions within the Association and schools have been asked to ensure that their communities are aware of the expectations for all involved in the sporting competitions.

General Behaviour

- Healthy, vigorous exercise, scrupulous regard for the spirit of the rules of the game, a willingness to submit to disciplined training, and the cultivation of a generous sportsmanship should be the goals of TAS Sports
- The host school has the right to expect that both visitors and members of its own community will adhere to its own particular customs and practices
- The competition table should not be regarded as the sole reason for competing
- Schools should ensure that players compete in their correct age group and that they adhere to the General Competition Rules and By Laws for the various sports
- Racial abuse or any other form of harassment will under no circumstances be tolerated by TAS. Players should be given no more than one warning before being sent off and reported to the school. Spectators likewise should be reported and asked to leave the sideline if guilty of racial abuse.

Conduct of Players

- A high standard of conduct is expected at all times, both on and off the field
- Each and every player should be an example of what a sportsperson should be, including an appreciation of good play and an acceptance of the mistakes made by fellow players
- The game should be played hard but never unfairly
- Ill temper or spite should never be shown; assistance for opponents when it appears desirable should be given
- The meeting of the opposing coach and captain by opposite numbers is to be commended

- Congratulations, thanks or cheers appropriate to the game, by the captain and/or players is to be encouraged
- The orders or instructions of the umpire, referee or designated official should be obeyed quickly, and any decisions, however unfavourable, should be accepted without question
- The use of drugs, including pain-killers, to improve or maintain the performance of any individual player or group of players is strictly forbidden.

Conduct of Spectators

- Good play by either side should be acknowledged by spectators in the appropriate manner. This can encourage players and help them to lift their game as the match or contest progresses. Unwise or fanatical barracking can make a player perform foolish actions in their play, or incite them to foul play, which is not to be condoned
- The Principal, or their representative, has the legal right to remove any person or persons who do not conform to the acceptable standards of behaviour as laid down by his school
- Consumption of alcohol by spectators during the conduct of a match or contest is not permitted
- Referees or umpires are not to be approached by spectators at any time before, during or after a match
- While cheering and supporting one's own team is recognised as part of the conduct of the game, and provided this barracking is within the requirements of the By Laws (with respect to Athletics and Swimming), it is to be encouraged 'anti barracking' is to be discouraged
- While the host school should make every endeavour to provide for the disposal of rubbish, all spectators should make every effort not to litter any parts of the playing fields and/or grounds.

District Representative and TAS Athletics

The TAS Athletics squad for 2018 has been named and information letter will be sent to both selected students and their parents. All students selected in the squad are asked to complete the online link to indicate whether or not they wish to participate in the carnival to enable final team selections to occur by the end of Week 5.

The Western District Ranges Athletics Carnival will be held on Monday 30 July and Wednesday 1 August at the University of Queensland, St Lucia Campus; students who were successful in being selected for the District team are to attend the Metropolitan West Regional Championships and will be notified once the results are processed.


