Speed Limit on Wulkuraka Connection Road

There has been recent discussion amongst some members of our parent community concerning the speed limit on Wulkuraka-Connection Road and I write to inform you of representations that have been made by the College in relation to this.

In response to a letter I wrote to Ipswich City Council in March 2013 requesting a reduction in the speed limit to 60km per hour during certain time frames (7am to 9am and 2pm to 4pm on school days) and/or installing flashing school zone signs on Wulkuraka Connection Road, I received a response from the Principal Engineer (City Infrastructure Planning) at Ipswich City Council. An excerpt of that response is as follows:

- Enhanced school zone signs are unable to be installed along Wulkuraka Connection Road. The reason for this is that your school does not meet the criteria for installation of enhanced school zone signs which are summarised below:
 - i) there is no pre-existing school zone on this road, and
 - ii) West Moreton Anglican College does not have a split campus across this road
- It should however be noted that Wulkuraka Connection Road does not meet any of the criteria for installation of a school zone. Therefore Council is unable to install a school zone now and then install the enhanced school zone signs at a later stage. So as mentioned above, unfortunately we cannot act upon your suggestion.
- It should be noted that the standards Council adhere to with regard to school zones are set by the State

Government and this is to ensure consistent application of sign installation throughout the State.

I trust this clarifies the situation. Should there be any change to developments in this regard, I shall keep you informed.

Snake Caution and Safety

Please be advised that given our semi-rural campus some venomous snakes including Eastern Brown snakes have been sighted on our College grounds. Most recently a red belly black snake was sighted near the Chapel and dam.

Students, staff and visitors are directed to take extra care when moving around the grounds and to avoid garden beds and areas of dense vegetation where these snakes might naturally reside

Additionally, students are asked to ensure that their school bags are always zipped closed and placed on bag racks rather than left opened and laying along paths adjacent to garden

beds as this may encourage snakes to enter. This is particularly relevant on or near ovals.

This also applies in the change rooms of toilet facilities. Students are asked not to place their bags on the floor but to leave them zipped up on the seats provided in the change room.

Additionally, the College has a safe work procedure for snakes and snake bites. Specific staff members have been trained in snake handling and the College Nurse is able to provide emergency first aid treatment in the unlikely event of a snake bite.

It is discriminatory that some students, such those 'labelled' disabled, must earn the right to be in the regular education mainstream or have to wait for educational researchers to prove that they can profit from the mainstream, while other students are showed unrestricted access simply because they have no label. No one should have to pass anyone's test or prove anything in a research study to live and learn in the mainstream of school and community life. This is a basic right, not something one has to earn. (Mastropieri & Scruggs, 2004).

I believe that we are a College that although strong, needs to continue to find inclusive practices to promote equity and excellence. It is important for all of our students to become successful learners, confident and creative individuals and active and informed citizens. I will deliver this message to our international families and colleagues and urge them to continue their relationship with our College.





As the school year draws to a close, it is time for students to be thinking about their next step. While some will have a clear-cut path ahead of them, others will have a million and one questions for you about their future – including the big one...

"What do I do if I don't go to uni?"

If you have students looking for a more hands-on approach to higher learning – or who just want to start earning but also want to get a qualification under their belt – an apprenticeship or traineeship might just be the way to go.


