THE PROBLEM OF POPULARITY

We all worry about friendships, play dates, birthday parties, who's in and who's out. Sometimes we worry more than our children do. We want them to be happy and enjoy having lots of friends. We are sad when they fall out with friends and anxious when they make a friend we are doubtful about. Popularity is a minefield, for parents as well as children. So how can we help our children develop the right skills?



Move the focus away from status.

Stop liking, liking, liking, and counting your likes. Ask questions that encourage children to target real, quality friends rather than fly-by-nights. Offline, don't convey to children and adolescents that they need to be in a particular club or clique. When we focus on popularity, our children won't learn how to identify healthy, reciprocal relationships.

Address their desire for popularity.

When our children are unhappy with their place in the pecking order, we can offer extra love, acknowledge their feelings and share our values. We may not be able to persuade them to not

care, but we can try to understand why this matters to them. Remind them what they'd lose if they sacrificed their existing friendships to pursue popularity.

It's difficult when a child wants to be popular, and there are no easy answers. Adults can point out that the most popular kids may also be lonely and lack trusting, reliable friendships. We can never know what is really happening in others' lives.

Focus on what they can control, such as being kind.

In every community, there are things that make you popular – and not everyone will have these things. However, by encouraging children to focus on what they can control, including being kind, you'll increase the odds that they land the right friends.

Turn outward to find new friends and activities.

There's a primal social impulse to be part of the pack, but children thrive when they think less about themselves and more about others. If your son or daughter comes home and says, 'No one likes me' or 'Everyone is walking to lunch without me', turn the tables. Encourage them to invite that new student to lunch or to tutor a younger student. When kids transcend the self, they feel empowered and confident. Engaging in something bigger than themselves also helps them stop ruminating about unreturned texts or their social position.

Cultivate good matches.

The unspoken rule of adolescence is that you're supposed to interact with the people closest to you in the social hierarchy. The culture may value physical attractiveness or athletic ability, but your child may thrive in a setting that values academic achievement or community service. Look for activities that align with your child's interests.

Your child's teachers and other College staff may be able to suggest good friend matches, pair them on projects and reinforce social skills.

Teach them skills they need to have more positive interactions.

Help struggling kids practise basic skills such as asking questions. Help them focus on connecting instead of impressing. Encourage children to identify common ground. If you're talking about something that only pertains to you, it's irrelevant to the friendship. Are they wearing a shirt from a music group you like? Did they watch the same football game last night?

Some children may not know how to join a conversation. Show them how to slide into action without interrupting, and match the emotional tone of the group. When we look at videos of children who end up being the most liked, they listen to others and try to build on and shape what they're doing instead of saying 'No, that's stupid, let's do it this way'.

Learn from children who change often.

Children from some families may have moved schools several times during their school years. Other students can learn from the openness that these students typically display. They may be more likely to approach a stranger in a crowded common room or to appreciate positivity over status. These children have figured out what works for them. They're not trying to find a forever friend or a best friend. There's a freedom to take risks on new friendships when you live in the moment. When the goal is to befriend people who are like-minded or share interests, the burden of popularity is lifted.

The best antidote to craving the wrong friends is finding the right ones and as parents, we can help. For example, helping children develop interaction skills, or creating opportunities to socialise by offering transport and making our home welcoming.

Drop-off and Pick-up Zones REMINDER

Our College drop-off and pick-up areas are designed so that parents can quickly set-down and pick-up children. They create a safe environment for students and keep traffic moving. Drop-off and pick-up areas are signed to indicate drivers' have a maximum of two minutes to drop-off or collect students.

When using the drop-off and pick-up areas drivers are asked to:

- use the area like a quick moving taxi rank
- move forward in the queue of vehicles within the signed area
- remain in their vehicle at all times
- observe the maximum two minute time - if your children are not ready to get straight into your vehicle at pick-up time, you will need to exit the carpark and re-enter the area again, and
- teach your children to look out for your vehicle and to get in quickly when you pull up – staff on duty will assist in reinforcing this message.

Drop-off and pick-up areas help to make school zones safe because:

- children are dropped-off and picked-up close to the school's entrance (so they do not need to cross any roads)
- they reduce traffic jams around the school (as parents and carers come and go faster than if they were to park and walk into the school grounds), and
- younger (non-school aged) children can stay in vehicles while their older siblings are dropped-off and picked-up—they do not need to walk, or be pushed or carried, to the school's entrance.

Chaplaincy

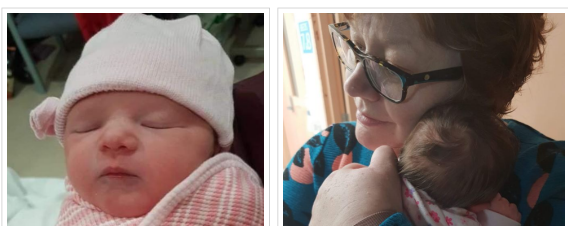

Christians believe that death is NOT the end; that love is stronger than death and that, in a very special way, our loved ones are still very much of our lives, especially when we remember them lovingly.

One doesn't "get over" grief or loss. The passing of a loved one changes us for ever, but it is possible, in time, to live a

hope-filled and useful life. Our remembrances of our beloved, whether they were with us for minutes, days, months or years, are a special gift. Tears are sacred, as is our love. If you're struggling with a particularly keen sense of grief at the moment, know that, whether or not you can feel it, you are held in the hollow of God's hand. I find that often people are afraid to mention someone's name because they think it will upset you. The problem is, sometimes it begins to feel as if they never existed to anyone but you. Tell those around you that it fills you with joy to be able to talk about them, even it also makes you cry. When their name sits on your tongue, it is a blessing. When someone else remembers them with love, you are both blessed and their memory shines bright. It can be scary to reach out to someone living with loss but please do. Grief can be so isolating. You won't 'catch it', you'll simply bring some strength and comfort to someone who is desperately in need of it.

If it's you who is grieving, it can be hard to reach out to others. Obviously it's better if they take the initiative, but sometimes we're feeling strong enough to break the shell of sadness to make contact with another. It's almost always a life-affirming thing to do. God created us to live in community. That is how we thrive best. That's why our College is such an amazing place. The whole ethos is shot through with the bonds of a loving and compassionate community. People here really do care for one another. Make use of that when you need it. Play a part in that whenever you can.

In the Book of Common Prayer 1662 in the burial service it says, "In the midst of life, we are in death" but I also believe that in the midst of death we can be in life too. On Sunday 28 October, just a day before what would have been mine and Nigel's 30th wedding anniversary, Frankie Evelyn-Nigella Leaves finally made her entrance into the world. Studying overseas

Thinking of combining your studies with travel? At ACU our students can study short-term programs, multiple semesters, or complete placements across the world – we even have our own campus in Rome.

We spoke to fourth-year physiotherapy student Sam, a graduate of West Moreton Anglican College, about his recent travels to Denmark to complete his final placement.



Has it been easy to combine your studies with travel?

"It's been really easy. I am currently in my last year of the Bachelor of Physiotherapy, which requires me to complete six five-week placements. My fifth placement of the year is in Denmark. Each semester we also receive a rest block (five weeks off instead of five weeks of placement), and this is conveniently placed either before or after an international placement, allowing me to travel."

What support did you receive when applying?

"As well as obtaining time off my studies to travel, I received the ACU Vice-Chancellor and President's Travel Grant worth \$500 to help cover the costs of my trip. ACU also provided travel insurance for the five-week placement. Also, I was lucky enough to receive the ACU National Student Association Travel Grant of \$500."

What was your favourite experience studying in Denmark?

"My favourite thing about Denmark and its people is their strong sense of community. At my workplace, all of the staff have lunch together and enjoy each other's company. I was placed in a community health centre in outpatient orthopaedics. The patients do not need to pay and we usually see them two to three times a week – in Australia we would probably only see them once a week.

On the weekends I got to travel around Denmark. I also took a couple of Fridays off so I could travel further. Following my placement I went to Munich, Belgrade, Budapest, Bratislava, Bucharest, Kiev, St Petersburg and Moscow."
